My reflection on the new Nissan Z

There has been a lot of talk about the new Z, and a bit of criticism around the car, mainly in regard to the interior, much of which has been carried over from the 370Z. Yes, the New Z is basically a vastly improved 370Z, and yes, the seats, knobs and door trims have been carried over, as has the running gear. After a first- hand experience with the car and having sat in it, I can report that it in no way looks dated. Its is extremely comfortable and has a good feel to it. I am still to drive one and I am working on this with Nissan. Maybe they will let us have one for a day for a deceit evaluation.

I think there are a few things we need to consider when evaluating this car.

- 1. This is a Nissan standalone vehicle, not a BMW look alike. Hence the underpinnings of the 370Z
- 2. Nissan has in the past built some great, if not the most, iconic sports cars.
- 3. This car is as good as any other sports car in this market segment.
- 4. The New Z is a real driver's car, tuned for the average enthusiastic driver.
- 5. Is very tunable
- 6. It is an affordable new sports car.

How to get the best from The L Series Engine.

The L series engine featured in Datsun cars throughout the 70's, either as a 4 or 6 cylinder. The engine ranged in cc from 1400 to 2800. This engine was developed by Nissan in Japan, and is said to be a derivative of the engine developed by the Prince Motor company which had started manufacturing it for the first Skylines before Nissan acquired that company. The engines were extremely robust. They can take a real hammering and last forever. The philosophy at Nissan was to over engineer everything and thus achieve





reliability. The L series engine was no exception. We have people join the club who have wanted to know "who they can get to rebuild their engine". Our answer has always been to ask "why". The usual reply is "I am rebuilding the car and want everything up to scratch" our advice has been "Refresh it, unless there is something wrong with it' it won't need rebuilding".

Anthony Baker ran this event, Anthony has a ton of knowledge around getting the best from these engines. He has a full blown S30 race car and has

been competing with it for many years. All the work done on his engines and car are done by him in his garage- come workshop. Anthony tapped into this knowledge database for us and covered making a standard engine run to its potential, right through to full blown race modifications up to a 3.2 L28 revving at 9,000 rpm.

The most interesting part of his talk was on getting up to 30% power gain from a standard engine by just making the engine flow better, and how this could be done with the standard issue twin carb set up.

He had an engine on site that he was able to pull down to help illustrate the different changes that could be made. This engine was our old cut away engine made lovingly by the late Brian Schou, which had fallen into disrepair after being stored for the last 5 years. Attendees were able to walk away with some of the good parts from this engine.



I have made a video of most of Anthony's presentation and will be working through posting this up somewhere for those who couldn't make it to the event. I will keep you posted.
